

Program Summary: This project was a combined effort of the Village of Hamilton (NY) in collaboration with C olgate University Environmental Studies students and the Hamilton Climate Preparedness Working Group. In the attached report, we have identify climate hazards to Hamilton, NY and the Central New York region along with the specific assets and systems that are and will be impacted. This project utilizes the research from the 2011 and 2014 ClimAID Report and the NYS 2100 Commission Report along with the Madison County Hazard Mitigation Report. Additionally, this report builds off of Hamilton's climate vulnerability self-assessment (comp leted in April 2019) and Hamilton's ongoing effort to address climate change at the municipal level. Finally, re sults from two public climate vulnerability workshops and surveys have been incorporated into the results an d recommendations. The attached report is a comprehensive vulnerability assessment covering the entire Vil lage of Hamilton and incorporating all relevant climate hazards (including future projections).
